Annual Fund Drive and Membership Renewal

As we come to the end of the year and close the sesquicentennial celebrations of the birth of William Henry Donner and Colonel James Schoonmaker's cavalry charge at the Third Battle of Winchester, we remind all our friends of the need to support the Greater Monessen Historical Society in our goal to preserve the history of Monessen. Mr. Sotus is installing a \$10,000 new pipe organ in the Olympic Theatre that is powered by electricity. (11-03-1914) Daily Independent

D. W. Burton has leased the New Monessen Theatre now that J. Moy Bennett has severed his connection to the entertainment house. (11-03-1914) Daily Independent

Monessen Lodge No. 773 B. P. O. Elks will dedicate their new home on Seventh Street on November 16, 2014. Governor John K. Tener is expected to lead the ceremonies. The new building cost \$35,000. The lodge has 400 members. (11-07-1914) Daily Independent

Miss Maude McLain, of Pittsburgh, and Miss Marie Watson, of Donora, will debate "Equal Suffrage" in Olympic Hall on November 9, 1914. There will be no admission charge, but a silver offering will be taken. (11-09-1914) Daily Independent

St, Leonard's Roman Catholic Church has secured a ninety day option on the Peter Schone property at the corner of Schoonmaker and Seventh Street for \$13,500. The plan is to erect a parochial school in the future. (11-17-1914) Daily Independent

The second annual Thanksgiving reunion of the Feightner Family was held at the home of Jacob Feightner, of 133 Oneida Street, on November 26, 1914. The Feightner Family came to Monessen fourteen years ago next February. (11-27-1914) Daily Independent

Joseph Safier, of Safier's Department Store, will distribute several hundred bushels of potatoes to poor families. The distribution will be handled through the Charity Committee of the Board of Trade. (12-08-1914) Daily Independent

Harry Fellenbaum, the ice, cold storage, and coal man of Monessen, will open a gasoline station at the corner of Second Street and Donner Avenue. He will contract with the Atlantic Refining Company to sell gas for eighteen cents a gallon. (12-08-1914) Daily Independent

George Shrader, Sr. will aid the needy people of Monessen by donating one thousand bushels of coal from his mine on the old Manown tract in East Monessen. The distribution will be through the Charity Committee. (12-15-1914) Daily Independent

Thomas W. Newhouse, age 52, proprietor of the Dewey Hotel, died on December 31, 1914. (01-01-1915) Monessen News

The new Syrian Greek Orthodox Church on Ninth Street was formally opened and dedicated on January 3, 1915 with morning and evening services. The Sunday collection was \$127.78, which was considered exceptionally good. The new bell was rung to announce the services. The bell was donated by the Russian church on Second Street. (01-05-1915) Daily Independent

The Conti Drug Company, located at the corner of Third Street and Schoonmaker Avenue, will open to the public on January 6, 1915. The fixtures are manufactured of Circassion Walnut and modern in every respect. (01-06-1915) Daily Independent

The Sheetz Hotel in the Third Ward, has been sold to Charles A. Guiss, of Wilmerding, PA., subject to the transfer of the license. (01-14-1915)

George Myford closed a deal to purchase the Monessen Hotel from Leonard Dorr. (01-18-1915) Daily Independent

Books and apparatus from the Jefferson High School building have been moved into the new Sixth Street high school building. Students from the old Jefferson Building will be moved to the second floor of the new high school on February 1, 1915. The Jefferson Building will now become an elementary school housing grades five and six. (01-30-1915) Daily Independent

Rev. and Mrs. H. O. McDonald, had a ten pound baby boy on January 18, 1915. (01-19-1915) Monessen News


