



The Historical Society will hold a Lusitania Dinner in memory of the one hundredth anniversary of the sinking of the luxury liner by the Imperial German Two Monessen residents, Mr. and Mrs. Navy. Thomas W. Agnew perished on the voyage. Samuel Proudfoot, of Pricedale, was also a passenger on the liner. As 2015 is also the twentieth anniversary of the Greater Monessen Historical Society, the dinner will serve a dual purpose of commemorating our anniversary. The event will be held at Jozwiak Hall in the St. Vincent DePaul Society Building on Grand Blvd, on Saturday, May 30, 2015, starting at 5 PM. Tickets are \$25 each and feature a menu of dishes served on the Lusitania. The dinner consists of hors-d'oeuvres, carved roast beef, chicken, browned (roasted) potatoes, Waldorf salad, cake and beverage. The Monessen Massage and Electrical Institute is located in the Barker Building and under the supervision of John Lindh. (05-06-1915) Daily Independent

Ted W. Kisor, owner of the Spring Farm Dairy, said the peach trees on his farm are loaded with fruit, and he expects to have 4000 bushels of peaches at the end of the season. (05-12-1915) Daily Independent

Burgess Dunlap is asking every person, who has the means, to donate a \$2.00 sack of flour to feed the seven million starving people in Belgium. (05-29-1915) Daily Independent

On Decoration Day, fifty boy scouts, a fife and drum corps, the Louhi Band and veterans marched from Third Street to the band stand at Sixth Street Park, where a crowd had gathered, including 2000 school children. Senator Edward Robbins spoke for over an hour in the hot sun, which was followed by the solemn rituals of the Grand Army of the Republic Post No. 178 of Belle Vernon. (06-01-1915) Daily Independent

New High School & Ninth Street Building Dedicated

Two of Monessen's most modern school buildings were dedicated in the spring of 1915 with appropriate ceremony. On May 31, the new ten room Ninth Street elementary school was toured by six hundred visitors. The building was in use during the last term, and student work was on display. The next night, Monessen's new \$170,000 high school

was opened for inspection. It is one of the most modern structures of its kind in the state. The building is constructed of brick and terra cotta and designed on the English collegiate style of architecture. It is located between Reed and Knox Avenues. On the first floor is located the superintendent's office and principal's rooms on either side of the main entrance. The main auditorium seats 1,200 and occupies the center section with a balcony. The second floor is occupied by the chemistry, biology and physical laboratories with a raised seat lecture room. The commercial department occupies three connecting rooms. There is also a large study room and library combination. The corridors, stairways and toilet rooms are of concrete finished with marbleithic and tile and are fire proof and sanitary. The finish of the building is in birch with mahogany stain. The building is electrically lighted with a deep water well equipped with a pumping system and storage tanks. The building will be cleaned by vacuum cleaners. There are outlets in all the rooms and halls. The basement has a fully equipped gymnasium, the domestic science department, manual training department, showers, dressing rooms, lockers and the boiler room.
