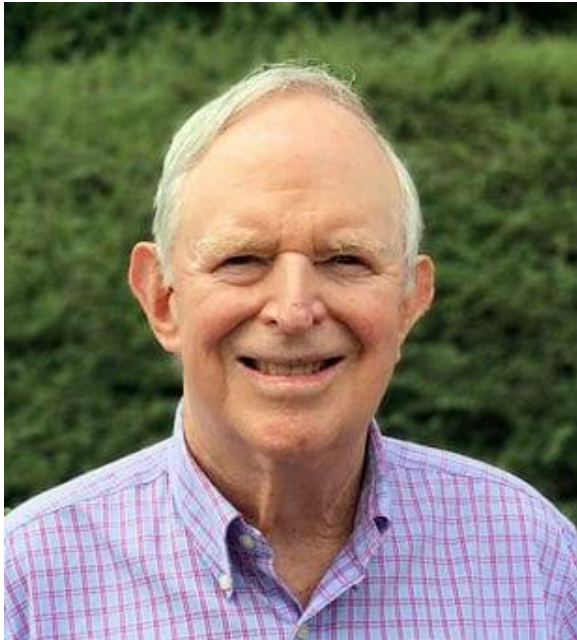
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**JAMES "DING"
SCHOONMAKER DIES.**
Grandson of Colonel James M.
Schoonmaker

The GMHS Board of Directors is saddened to learn of the passing of our great friend and supporter, James M. Schoonmaker II. "Ding" was always interested in the work of the Greater Monessen Historical Society and annually contributed to carry on the work of the group and promote the legacy of Colonel

Schoonmaker. Ding and his wife, Patrice generously underwrote the costs of the 175th birthday celebration of Colonel Schoonmaker held in 2017.

One of America's sailing heroes, James M. "Ding" Schoonmaker II, 87, passed away peacefully on January 19, 2021, at his winter home in Naples, Florida. Ding was born on June 10, 1933, in Pittsburgh, PA. His grandfather James M. Schoonmaker was the youngest colonel in the Civil War and received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his actions at the Third Battle of Winchester. In his later life, the Colonel served as Chairman of the Board of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad.

Ding was a long time champion and steward of the sport of sailing. He won his first race in 1944 in Rhode Island. After successfully sailing the Finn, Flying Dutchman, and Soling, Ding's passion shined brightest in the Star Class and at the age of 19 he placed second in the Olympic Trials and was named

the team's alternate for the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki. He earned that honor again in 1964 at the Olympic Games in Tokyo. Over the years he won the North American, South American, Western Hemisphere, European and World Championships in the Star Class, and was named Rolex Yachtsman of the Year in 1971.

He played an active role in the leadership of U.S. Sailing and the International Sailing Federation. For his distinguished career, in 1988 he was awarded the Nathanael Greene Herreshoff Award, US Sailing's highest honor, and in 2011 the Beppe Croce Award, World Sailing's highest honor. In 2018, he was inducted into the National Sailing Hall of Fame and the following year, he was presented the Distinguished Service Award by the National Maritime Historical Society. Notable among all of his philanthropic work was creation of the U.S. Sailing Center in Miami, Florida in 1987. He was the driving force behind the training facility which provides Olympic sailors access to train and compete on Biscayne Bay, and on which the building bears his name. His efforts also initiated the World Youth Sailing Trust to help aspiring sailors in emerging countries and creating the U.S. Sailing Foundation in 1990.

The Board extends its sympathy to Ding's wife and family.



Monessen's Connection to Old Hollywood Dies

George Christy, formerly of Monessen and noted Hollywood gossip columnist, died of heart failure in Santa Monica, California on Aug. 11, 2020, at the age of 93. The son of Kaliopé and Stephanos Stupakis, he was born and raised in Monessen. While attending Monessen High School, George excelled academically (class salutatorian), and showed great promise as a writer, debater and leader. In 1944, he went off to Carnegie Tech to study acting and writing in the drama school. Following graduation, he moved to New York City. During his New York period, George decided to change his surname, Stupakis, to his mother's maiden name, Christy, as he was writing and serving as commentator for the first Hellenic-American Television Hour in New York. Hollywood is where George established himself as a gossip and party columnist who wrote for The Hollywood Reporter for more than 26 years. His friend, Canadian

producer-director Barry Avrich said, “George Christy was a combination of Louella Parsons, Hedda Hopper and Walter Winchell in the old Hollywood style of reporting.” His column was called “The Great Life.” In 1963 his first book, “All I Could See From Where I Stood,” was published. Most recently, he wrote a column for the Beverly Hills Courier, a weekly newspaper. George had a keen interest in food and often hosted star-packed lunches in Hollywood and Canada. His Hollywood lunches at Spagnos and The Ivy helped put them on the map. For 30 years, ending in 2013, he hosted lunches at the Toronto International Film Festival. While “The Tonight Show”, starring Johnny Carson, was on the air, George appeared a number of times as a guest. On occasion he showed up in films, playing small parts in such films as “Die Hard” (1988) and “Seven” (1995). A connection with Monessen and his relatives lasted throughout his life. He was a dedicated member of the Greater Monessen Historical Society, supporting it, and enjoying its newsletters. One year he sent the museum a fully decorated Christmas tree. George was preceded in death by his brother Tony.



Monessen’s Link to the World of Fashion Dies

On January 10, 2020, Ed Filipowski, aged 58, passed away in his home in New York. He was co-chairman of public relations firm KCD. Alongside long-time co-chairman Julie Mannion, he presided over the fashion agency's eight partners, three offices and five divisions: media relations, event and fashion show production, digital, entertainment and technology. A close friend and adviser to many in the industry, Filipowski represented such clients as Tom Ford, Alexander McQueen, John Galliano at Maison Margiela, Versace, Givenchy, Tory Burch, Helmut Lang, Anna Sui, Victoria Beckham, Olivier Rousteing at Balmain, Tommy Hilfiger, Brandon Maxwell and Prabal Gurung.

Filipowski arrived at the Keeble Cavaco & Duka Firm two years after its inception, hired by founder Kezia Keeble after sending her flowers following the firm’s signing of Charivari, a then buzzy, upscale specialty store.

When co-founders John Duka and Keeble passed away in 1989 and 1990 respectively, Filipowski and Mannion informally inherited the company, working alongside Paul Cavaco. In 1991, they were named partners, and in 1993, they re-named the firm KCD after Cavaco departed to *Harper's Bazaar*.

The firm began expanding into Europe and opened its Paris office, where KCD's European headquarters are now based. With the rise of digital media — a seismic shift for the industry — KCD developed digital platform Fashion GPS and established its digital division in 2010.

In 2016, the firm launched its entertainment and technology division, whose clients include fashion platform Launchmetrics, Tony Awards, the Metropolitan Museum of Art Costume Institute Benefit Gala and Paramount Pictures, which hired KCD to work on the premiere of "Zoolander 2."

The remains of Alexander R. Herron arrived in Monessen from France. Arrangements are being handled by the Wright Morgue with a military funeral Sunday at St. Leonard's Roman Catholic Church and burial in Grandview Cemetery. He died on August 24, 1918. (01-14-1921) Daily Independent

The fruit and confectionery store of Carlo Taranto, 1253 Morgan Avenue, was raided by Pennsylvania State Police. They confiscated a quantity of whiskey. (01-22-1921) Daily Independent

The Myob Club, a new social organization, held its first meeting last night at the Fifth Avenue Hotel. (02-08-1921) Daily Independent

Sam Lee, the Chinese Laundryman, who has been located in the Opera House block for several years, has relocated to the basement of the Fifth Avenue Hotel. (02-09-1921) Daily Independent

A wrestling match will be held in the Croatian Hall with George Kotsonaros fighting John Kozalinskis, the Polish Giant. Lulo Havenpal the Famous Finn, will meet Ivan Orloss, the Russian. Tickets will be \$1.40 and ladies are invited. (02-12-1921) Daily Independent

The old Opera House on Schoonmaker Avenue has been remodeled at a cost of \$50,000 and renamed the Rialto Theatre. It has a seating capacity of 1600. The building was recently purchased by the Slovak Club. (02-14-1921) Daily Independent

George E. Wahlstrom, the Director of the Louhi Band, has been awarded the Cross of the White Rose, by President Stolberg of Finland. It is their highest honor. (02-15-1921) Daily Independent

The Monessen Board of Trade will hold their annual banquet at Monessen High School Gym. Four hundred and sixteen plates of Turkey dinner are being prepared. Douglas Malloch, the famed poet of the woods and lecturer, will be the keynote speaker. At 5:45, the Little Giant, the train carrying Colonel James M. Schoonmaker will arrive with officials of the P&LE Railroad, the Pittsburgh Steel Products Company, the American Sheet and Tin Plate Company, Page Steel and Wire Company along with the Schubert Quartette. Both men and women will be admitted with the understanding that smoking will be permitted in the lower room. (03-02-1921) Daily Independent

There was a fire at the Vienna Bake Shop, at the corner of Oneida and Donner, which resulted in a loss of \$5000. The crew of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad noticed the flames and aroused the town by persistent blowing of the train whistles. The blaze started in the rear and spread to the garage and stable killing a horse and burning the delivery truck. Donora Firemen responded to assist. (03-05-1921) Daily Independent

Monessen hosted its first movie star when Franklyn Farnum appeared onstage at the Olympic Theatre and gave a short address to his fans. Mr. and Mrs. Andy Carson, of Donner Avenue, had the honor to serve dinner at their home, before he went to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Emil

Vernaccini for a reception. In a career that spanned vaudeville, silent movies and talkies, Frank Farnum appeared in 1,100 films. He was known for his westerns and also appeared in multiple Academy Award winning movies. (03-10-1921) Daily Independent

INGREDIENTS

- 2 eggs.
- 2 tbs. sugar.
- 2 tbs. butter.
- 1 teaspoon salt.
- 1 pt. milk.
- Flour to make thin batter. (I used about 2 cups flour)
- 2 large teaspoons baking powder

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Separate the eggs
2. Beat yolks and add sugar and salt
3. Melt butter then add milk and flour and stir to combine.
4. Beat egg whites until stiff (but not dry) peaks form
5. Stir one spoonful of whites into the mixture to lighten and then fold remainder of egg whites and baking powder
6. Bake in a hot waffle iron.
