

Colonel James M. Schoonmaker was always a staunch advocate for Monessen. He took a personal interest in the development of the town and contributed toward its early success. The Greater Monessen Historical Society carries on the Colonel's legacy. The Historical Society is all those wishing to preserve the industrial and ethnic history of the greater Monessen area. To accomplish that goal, members and friends need to step forward and become part of Schoonmaker's Army. Visit Monessen Public Library & Cultural Center for Genealogy

Please remember to support our local library. Monessen Public Library & Cultural Center has a beautiful Pennsylvania Room on the second floor that is accessible by elevator. It contains Pennsylvania county histories, old atlases, and cemetery, marriage and birth records from many areas of the Commonwealth. Most of the volumes do not circulate if in the Pennsylvania Collection, so pages will have to be photocopied for twenty cents a page or notes taken. They also have a great set of Civil War regimental histories.

Downstairs, there are books on various aspects of Pennsylvania history that do circulate for a two week period. They also have census microfilm, as well as microfilm of the Monessen Daily Independent, the Monessen News Call, the Valley Independent and the Charleroi Mirror newspapers. There is also microfilm of the Sandborn Fire Insurance Maps for Monessen and Monongahela. They have Ancestry.com for use while in the library on the computers. Users will need a Westmoreland Library Network card. The Library is also an affiliate with the Salt Lake City Mormon FamilySearch Library and can borrow microfilm for a small fee from that facility for your in-library use.

One Hundred Years ago in the newspapers November, 1913 -- January, 1914

Mr. Cherkin, has moved his grocery store from Third Street to the former Philips Wallpaper Store on Schoonmaker Avenue, between Fifth and Sixth Street. (11-06-1913) Daily Independent

T. W. Kisor received three fine cows from Washington County. Ted has twenty-six Guernsey and Jerseys on his dairy farm. (11-13-1913) Daily Independent

John Martin, Michael Giba, Martin Kozlik, Fritz Seko and John Check have applied for a charter to create an organization to be called "The Slavish Beneficial Union of Monessen". (11-13-1913) Daily Independent

An attempt was made to unionize the workers of the local motion picture and vaudeville houses into the Picture Machine Operators Union. As many of the same men also work in the local mills, ultimatums were given by the mills that if they valued their mill jobs, there should be no thought toward unionizing the theaters. (11-29-1913) Daily Independent

Miss Jessie Eckerman, globe trotter, scientist, author, lecturer and suffragist will lecture on "Equal Suffrage" on December 12, 1913. The newspaper said princesses and kings have deemed themselves honored to receive and hear Miss Eckerman. (12-09-1913) Daily Independent

Fifty Monessen citizens met in the Methodist Church, Schoonmaker and Fourth, and formed a permanent suffrage organization to demand a suffrage amendment for the constitution. (12-20-1913) Daily Independent

Patrolman Kit Wheatley was found dead in bed at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Hugh McLaughlin, at 120 Knox Avenue. (12-21-1913) Daily Independent

Joseph Cherkin, of 529 Schoonmaker Ave., died January 2, 1914 at the age of 58 from pneumonia. He operated a grocery store in the former Frank Phillips Wallpaper Store. (01-03-1914) Daily Independent

Miss Helen A. Allen, secretary of the Allegheny County Woman's Suffrage Association, will speak in the Methodist Church on January 15, 1914. Instrumental and vocal music will also be provided. Men and women are urged to be present. Also, Miss Hannah J. Patterson, State Chairman of the Woman's Suffrage Association, will deliver an address on January 22, 1914 in Monessen. (01-13-1914) Daily Independent

The A.M.E. Church Literary Society issued an invitation to join them on January 19, 1914 for a debate on: "Resolved that the human family is degenerating". Amos Lucas and Alex Pangburn in the affirmative and Robert Philips and Mose King in the negative. (01-19-1914) Daily Independent

David Myers and Walter McLaughlin, two Monessen chicken fanciers, won honors at the Connellsville Poultry Show. (01-19-1914) Daily Independent

Miss Edith Cadugan and Samuel Wagner, both of Monessen, married on November 5, 1913 at the home of the bride's parent's on Reed Avenue. They will live in Monessen. (11-05-1913) Daily Independent

William C. Engel, Jr. says the report of his marriage to Miss Lillian Snyder, of Pittsburgh, was a practical joke. (11-07-1913) Daily Independent

The wedding of Anna E. Riley, of Charleroi, and Frank A. Elexander, of Monessen, was held at St. Jerome's Catholic Church in Charleroi on November 5, 1913. They will reside in Monessen. (11-10-1913) Daily Independent

Miss Florence May Austin, of Monessen, and Clyde M. Fishel, of Canton, Ohio, were married on November 08, 1913. (11-10-1913) Daily Independent

Charles Teese, of Webster, and Miss Lizzie Brew, of Pittsburgh, received a marriage license in Pittsburgh on November 10, 1913. (11-11-1913) Daily Independent

Miss Clara Reese and Richard Nelson, both of Belle Vernon, will marry on December 24, 1913. (11-28-1913) Daily Independent

December 15, 1913. The groom is an employee of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad. The bride was previously the night Bell Telephone operator and lately the clerk and bookkeeper with the Phillips Wallpaper Store on Schoonmaker. (12-16-1913) Daily Independent

Al Briggs, of Monessen, and Miss Elizabeth Sheets, of Fayette City, were intercepted by Officer Albright at the P&LE station this morning and prevented from eloping to Cumberland to be married. The bride's parents had phoned in the request to stop the couple. The groom-to-be owns the Pan-American Restaurant, corner of Schoonmaker and Fifth Avenue. (12-20-1913) Daily Independent

Dan's Archives

The fourth Annual Monessen Board of Trade Banquet was held in Turner Hall on Thursday, January 22, 1914 and attended by more than two hundred guests. Prior to the banquet, a reception was held in the Kilroy Hotel for Colonel James M. Schoonmaker, William Henry Donner and other distinguished guests from Pittsburgh and the County Seat.

The Isabelle Thoburn Class of the M. E. Church took the responsibility of handling the cooking and serving of the dinner, which consisted of cream of tomato soup, celery, olives, baked white fish, chip potatoes, roast young turkey with dressing, cranberry sauce, mashed potatoes, hot biscuits, combination salad, ice cream, cake, mints, coffee and cigars.

Professor Davis provided the singing entertainment, and Rev, Bungard gave the invocation. C. R. New reviewed the work of the Board of Trade over the past year.

The main speaker of the evening was Colonel Schoonmaker, who reminisced about the early history of the town, and told how the site came into his possession and his cooperation with William Henry Donner in building the Tin Plant. The Colonel then introduced Mr. Donner, who was surprised, as he was not scheduled to speak. He rose to the occasion and explained the freight rates and fuel considerations in selecting Monessen as the site of his mill.

The quote of the evening belonged to Colonel Schoonmaker who said, "I challenge the world to produce a town that in fifteen years has made the progress and development Monessen has. To rise from a farm and waste land, to a modern little city in this length of time is indeed a challenge to the world. I fill with pride, and swell out my chest when I speak of Monessen".
