
You may not see us, but we are here ©

G. C. Murphy 5 & 10

In 2010, the Westmoreland County "One Book, One Community" reading program will feature Jason Togyer's new book, "For the Love of Murphy's". It is a history of the McKeesport-based G. C. Murphy Company, which operated five and ten cent stores throughout the region. Our research shows the Murphy Company purchased the J. K. Skelley Store at 265 Donner Avenue and reopened it as a G. C. Murphy 5 and 10 on June 7, 1902. The store later relocated to between 5th and 6th Streets and remained in business until the early 1970's. We are searching for photos and Murphy items for a small exhibit to coincide with the county book program. We also want to hear from former Murphy employees.

Civil War Anniversary

The 150th anniversary of the beginning of the War of the Rebellion or Civil War will be observed with great ceremony starting in April of 2011. Our own Colonel James M. Schoonmaker, a highly decorated veteran of the conflict, was the Chairman of Pennsylvania's 50th anniversary commemorations of the Battle of Gettysburg in 1913. He was later selected as Pennsylvania's Outstanding Civil War veteran. Westmoreland County has asked the historical societies to begin gathering photos and memorabilia of the war for their own exhibits. Do you have ancestors who fought the war? 

Annual Architectural Design Challenge

About 135 middle and high school students from 17 Westmoreland County schools are participating in the 14th Annual Architectural Design Challenge, sponsored by the Pittsburgh History & Landmarks Foundation (PHLF) and offered in 2009-10 in cooperation with the Greater Monessen Historical Society (GMHS).

During orientation sessions in Monessen on October 29 and October 30, students toured the main street area of Monessen, photographed and documented their building site, discussed the needs of the community, and learned about the design process. Vito Beneccio, Dr. Martin Dudas, Madeline Dudas, Candis Kelley, Susanna Swade, Julie Thieser, and Gary Strelick from the GMHS, along with Louise Sturgess and Karen Cahall of PHLF, served as tour leaders. We thank Pastor John Custer for allowing us to hold the orientation sessions on both days in Orchard Christian Fellowship Church.

Over the next several months, students will work in teams to (1) create a model showing their vision for the vacant Monessen Savings & Trust Building (500 Donner Avenue) and the vacant lot beside it; and (2) create a main street facade drawing of the south side of the 500 block of Donner Avenue incorporating their design recommendations (for signage, lighting, facade restoration, in-fill construction, etc.).

Middle school students will present their models and drawings on Monday, February 22, 2010, and high school students will present on Tuesday, February 23. Professional architects, Monessen citizens, and members of the GMHS will be invited to listen to and comment on the student projects.

One Hundred Years ago in the newspapers November 1909-January 1910

An afternoon tea was given on November third by Mrs. John Allen of Tenth Street, in honor of the birthday of her daughter, Miss Frances Gould.

Professor F. A. McCloskey opened a school of dance in Kelly's Hall on Thursday evenings. Class work will be conducted from 7:30 until 9 PM followed by two hours of dancing during the ten week course.

Chicken thieves are operating in McMahan Borough despite the vigilance of concerned farmers.

The twice enlarged Bijou Theatre is featuring the picture, "The Cattle Thieves". Louis Brusa sang "If Those Lips Could Only Speak" due to many requests from the public to hear the song again.

The Colonna Reading Club has been organized and will meet weekly. Good authors and different works will be read and discussed.

In November, the Jeffersonian Literary Society of the High School debated the subject, "Resolved that Shylock was the strongest character in the "Merchant of Venice". Lillian Chamberlain and Mabel Gregg for the negative won the debate. Mary Jamieson and Regina Conway took the positive stand. Mildred Herron played a violin solo and Louise Frazier read a Thanksgiving proclamation. Herman Snyder presented "Thanksgiving now and a year ago", while Thomas Ryan gave a recitation.

Membership in the Monessen Board of Trade has reached one hundred.

Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Burns had a nine pound baby on November 21.

Turner's Hall will be dedicated at the corner of Second and Donner on November 25. Building costs reached \$30,000 for the new three story building that houses a modern gymnasium, lodge room and hall. Membership is around 400.

Come to the Christian Church on Sixth Street for Thanksgiving Dinner. Tickets are thirty-five cents for a meal consisting of roast turkey and stuffing, gravy, hot biscuits, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce, coleslaw, celery, pickles and coffee. Ice cream will be five cents extra. Cake will also be five cents extra.

The Sanitary Committee of the Borough Council and the Board of Health have announced a campaign to clean Monessen of filth and dirt in the streets, alleys and around private residences.

John Kilroy, the owner of the Kilroy Hotel, died Sunday November 28 from stomach trouble at age 65. He came to Monessen in 1898.

Monessen's Lincoln Club celebrated their first anniversary on December 4 with a banquet at the Sheetz Hotel. Daniel Reamer, the Burgess, spoke as did Colonel Charles Derickson, on the life of Lincoln.

The Luna Theatre is showing the picture, "Through the Breakers", which deals with the sin of neglect of the home by the wife and mother.

On Christmas Eve, the Grand Hotel parlor held a Christmas tree illuminated with ornamental lights and laden with gifts for the guests and employees. Santa Claus arrived at 10 PM to pass out the gifts. Each employee also received a turkey from Mr. Schuyler.

Philip Shepler, pioneer resident and former member of the firm of Shepler and Vennerii Meat Market on Schoonmaker, died of tuberculosis December 29.

Three thousand tickets were sold for the Star Theatre on New Year's Day. The box office glass windows shattered due to the pressing of the crowd during the first performance. William Lewis of Sixth Street won the drawing for a Shetland pony.

Monessen will be one of the first towns in Pennsylvania to follow the new law regulating automobile speeds through the streets of a town or borough. New signs bearing the words, "Danger, Go Slow" in five inch letters will be erected. Between the new signs, the speed limit will be twelve miles per hour.

On January 7, 1910, the high school Jeffersonian Literary Society debated whether "Football should be abolished". James Herron and Eugene Weller argued the negative and won. They were paired against Cora Smith and Rachel Johnson. Regina Conway performed a piano solo and Mildred Herron gave a vocal solo. Margaret Ruse presented a recitation, while Ethel Gantt read an essay.

W. H. Wagner had a surprise forty-third birthday party on January 7.

James A. McGuire, age 70, and the first engineer of the Carnegie Hoop Mill, has resigned his position and moved to Crafton to spend more time with his family.

The Monongahela Hotel was sold to Harry Seanor and Denna Shea of Greensburg.

George Nash, Superintendent of Pittsburgh Steel, celebrated his fifty-second birthday with a surprise party in the banquet room at his home attended by seventy men. The foremen of the plant presented him with a mahogany desk.

Yee Foon, a Chinese student, was enrolled in the McKinley School in the second grade. Way Sing, the laundryman, is his guardian.

Jacob T. Roley, of Belle Vernon, died in his fourth term as justice of the peace of Belle Vernon. Squire Roley was seventy-five. Burgess Daniel Reamer was a pallbearer.

Due to extreme crowding in the Iowa Building, the room housing the manual training equipment in the Jefferson High School will be cleared out and utilized to relieve the congestion.



End of Year Weddings of 1909 & Early Weddings of 1910

Isaac J. Miller of Monessen and Carrie Knight of Elwood City were married November 2, 1909 in Beaver. The groom was formally a singer at the Luna Theatre but is presently working in the Star Café.

D.S. Muckley, General Superintendent of the Page Plant, was married and is now living in a home at the corner of Reed Avenue and Oneida Street. The groom was treated to a business party by his associates at the Sheetz Hotel on November 16.

Alice Geller of Monessen and Wilson Troupe of Munhall will marry December 22, 1909 at the home of her Aunt, Mrs. Theodore Weston, on Schoonmaker. They will live in Homestead.

Urban A. Mullin of Monessen and Lucy A. Black of Pawtucket, R.I. married on December 28. They will eventually live on Fourth Street. The Groom works in the Chemistry Dept. of the Pittsburgh Steel Co.

Charles Kaplanis of Monessen and Hilda Cypher of New Castle were married on December 29 in Pittsburgh. The groom is part owner of the Luna Theatre and the Luna Restaurant on Donner Avenue. They will reside in Monessen.

Miss Ray W. Johnson, of Goshen, N.J. wed George V. Barrett of Monessen on December 30. Mr. Barrett is a millwright at the Pittsburgh Steel mill. They will live on Donner Avenue.

Miss Arena Duff of Donora, a Monessen teacher, has married and did not return in the new year.

Miss Sarah Lenhart, stenographer to the superintendent of schools, was married in Belle Vernon on January 1, 1910 and moved to Ohio.

Anna Hartstein of Donora and Samuel Morton of Monessen were united in marriage on January 4. The groom is employed in the local mills.

The sister of Mrs. George Nash, Amelia Theiss, will marry Warren Howard January 5, 1910 at the Nash Home. The groom works for the Pittsburgh Steel Co.

Edwin J. Taylor, the foreman at the P&L.E. freight station wed Isabella Murphy of Belle Vernon in Cumberland MD on January 13, 1910. They will live in Monessen.

Muriel Brandis of Monessen and Thomas Cooper of Belle Vernon were married January 19, 1910. The groom is a glass worker. They will live in Monessen.

Hanukkah in 1909

On December 12, 1909, the local Jewish congregation held an elaborate service in the Star Theatre. Music was by Mr. Brenner with an invocation by H. Levendorf. Harry Cramer, Edith Tanzer, Anna Martin, Rose Cramer, D. Janavitz, D. Lebowitz, I. Slifkin, Lucy Borenstein, B. Cramer, A Safier, B. Rosen, Ethel Kline, Freda Shapira, Ruth Rosenbloom, Elsie Janavitz, Jesse Nayhouse, Harry Weiner, Berdie Goodman, Dora Kaufman, and Belle Pollock were in charge of recitations. I. Levendorf and M. Klein gave violin solos. A. Tanzer delivered the address and H. Levendorf the benediction.

Original Christmas Poem

Written in 1909 by fourteen year old Mabel Eaglen, a Monessen school girl, and published in the newspaper.

Christmas is coming, best day of the year, With snow and ice, and sleigh bells so dear, Holly and mistletoe, candles and toys, Ready for all good little girls and boys.

Now we are ready, the toys are arranged, And the great pleasure nothing can change, Children are all snuggled down in their beds, Pretty clean faces and brown curly heads. Soon they'll awaken with bright glowing eyes. Laughing with jolly and amazing surprise, Dancing with wonder around the tree, Happier children there never could be.

Last horses sold in 1928

Monessen City Council voted in February of 1928 to sell the last city-owned team of horses and replace them with a motor truck. Council also voted to purchase a car for the superintendent of the sanitary department and to buy a new motorcycle for the police department.



New High School was overcrowded by 1919

The new Monessen High School that opened in February of 1915 at the corner of Sixth and Reed was overcrowded by the fall of 1919. The School Board made plans to utilize all basement rooms to relieve the crowded classrooms. The Monessen School District during the 1919-1920 school year employed 117 teachers and had 4300 pupils.



Founding Landowner died 100 years ago from accident

Alexander McMahan died December 25, 1909 at 7:30 PM at the Woodlawn Inn Hotel in McMahan Borough as a result of an accident he had on November twenty-second. Mr. McMahan and a driver were coming down Ninth Street hill, when the horse staggered and plunged over a thirty-five foot embankment. The driver was unhurt. Following the development of a blood clot in his brain and partial paralysis, little hope was given for his recovery.

He was born in Allegheny County in 1843, the son of Hugh McMahan and Margaret Manown-McMahan. Mr. McMahan promoted the town of Fordham, an earlier venture for the site around Monessen, but the project was abandoned. With the formation of the East Side Land Company, the McMahan farm, as well as the land of others, was purchased to begin the new venture.

Mr. McMahan was formerly a member of the McMahan Borough Council and was currently first chief burgess of McMahan. He was a Democrat and a Catholic.

He was survived by his wife and ten children. There are also three sisters and two brothers. Requiem High Mass was said at St. Leonard's Church by Rev. A. J. Wigley with interment in the family plot at Belle Vernon Cemetery. His estate was valued at \$52,685.

Child Labor a concern in 1906

Superintendent of Schools, R. W. Himelick urged Monessen mill owners not to employ school age children in the plants, when they should be getting an education. The industrialists responded that they would do everything in their power to get all school age children back into the schools. The number of employed children was said to be only thirty. Pittsburgh Steel Superintendent George Nash immediately ordered all foremen to refuse employment to school age children.



Linden Elementary School

A Presidential Visit

Ninety years ago, the Monessen Board of Trade (Chamber of Commerce) invited "one of the country's greatest living statesmen" to be the keynote speaker at their annual lecture series. Former President William Howard Taft accepted, and through his secretary said he had heard of "this busy bee-hive of industry" and comes with a great deal of interest in the city. Ticket prices were set at \$1.50 and October 16, 1919 chosen as the date by the Educational Committee of the Board of Trade.

The newspaper said the ex-president will be greeted by one of the largest audiences in the history of Monessen. President Taft arrived early in the day and lunched at the home of J. Howard Kelly, who escorted him to the capacity filled high school auditorium. He spoke for over an hour on the topic of the League of Nations in a forceful manner and to great applause. The follow-up story in the newspapers said President Taft had a pleasing introduction with a generous and telling manner and spoke in an analytical style that was deliberate in procedure with humorous sarcasm. Following the lecture, a reception was held with audience members permitted to cross the stage and shake hands with the statesman. The crowds felt it was the best lecture ever delivered in Monessen.

President Taft graciously accepted a request to stay over and address the school students the next day. A lunch followed at the Economical Club of the Pittsburgh Steel Products Company. The Pittsburgh Steel orchestra furnished music for the affair. A four course meal consisting of spring chicken, fruit cocktail and cigars was served by the Boy Scouts, who acted as waiters. T. J. Dobson was the vocalist chosen to accompany the orchestra. W. C. Reitz was toastmaster. H. R. Pore spoke on behalf of the town.

In his remarks to the workmen of the plant, who were allowed to observe the proceedings during their lunch time, President Taft urged full production to combat the high cost of living. He said the high cost of living would gradually decrease through productivity and appealed to the workers to do their part. In closing, he paid tribute to Monessen as a great industrial district known the world over.

The Monessen Board of Trade announced after expenses they had made one hundred dollars profit from the sale of tickets and would divide the money between the high school library and a fund for future lecture courses.
