
Christmas Photos of Monessen

Christmas Recipes

The following recipe comes from the new book added to the Museum Shoppe, "Celebrate Christmas...Italian Style" by Lawrence G. Kozlowski.

Green Beans in Tomato Sauce (Fagiolini in Salsa De Pomodoro)

2 cans of green beans (Drained)
1 large can of chopped tomatoes (Drained & reserve juice)
2 tsp. salt
½ cup olive oil
2 cloves of garlic (Minced)
1 small onion (Minced)
1 teaspoon basil (Dried or fresh)
Pepper (Season to taste)
Italian cheese (Grated)

In a large sauce pan, heat olive oil and saute minced onion, basil and garlic until the onions are tender. Add beans and tomatoes. Cook slowly for 20 minutes, adding additional tomato juice as needed. Serve hot garnished with Italian cheese.

The next recipe is for an alcoholic drink that has been passed down through the family of Monessen Founder, George Orlando Morgan.

Sangria:

1 part (quart or gallon) dry (not sweet) red wine. Little bit of cognac Cut up various fruits and add to the mix a couple of hours before serving:

- Oranges
- Lemons
- Peaches

- Any other preferred solid (not bananas, kiwis, etc.) fruit

Mix to taste -some people add sugar or sugar syrup.

(Add LAST, just before serving).

1/4 part club soda or Perrier-type water 1/4 part bubbly fruit drink.

Careful, don't make it too sweet, so it can be drunk easily.

George Orlando Morgan II used to call it "Sparkling Claret".

The Frank Stefanski Bakery, at 225 Knox Avenue, was destroyed by fire on October 31, 1917. (11-01-1917) Daily Independent

William Riley, John Husher, and Matt Keifer are hunting raccoon and rabbit near Waynesburg. (11-09-1917) Monessen News

Sam Lee, who has operated a laundry business in the Opera House for eight years, has sold his business and will move to Pittsburgh. (11-16-1917) Daily Independent

The last seven and a half acres of "Belle Voir", the Alexander McMahan Farm, has been purchased by the Pittsburgh Steel Company for \$23,760. (11-23-1917) Monessen News

Former Westmoreland County Sheriff, John H. Trescher died unexpectedly on November 27, 1917. He was the owner of the Grand Hotel and had operated the Monessen newspaper, "The Leader", which he started in 1901. (11-28-1917) Daily Independent

The Iowa School Annex should open on December 10, 1917 and house 250 to 300 pupils. (11-30-1917) Monessen News

The Victoria Coal Company has been organized with James Bailey as mining foreman. (11-30-1917) Monessen News

The vacant slaughterhouse, at the end of Seneca Street that was formerly owned by Frank Venneri, was destroyed by a mysterious fire. The fire department was unable to make hose connections, due to the distance to the nearest fire plug, so the blaze was let to burn. (11-30-1917) Daily Independent

The Dave Seder Clothing Store caught fire after the gas heater under the store floor was lit at 8 AM. The building, which stands next to the Merchants Hotel was not heavily damaged, although the stock was ruined by smoke and water. (12-17-1917) Daily Independent

The former Firestone Distilling Company will be converted into a large flour and feed store around February 1, 1918, by M. Krasik, of Charleroi. (12-26-1917) Daily Independent

Fire broke out on December 30, 1917, at the Iowa School, due to an overheated furnace,

which ignited near the chimney. The damage was minor. (12-31-1917) Daily Independent

The John Hako Bakery, on Schoonmaker Avenue near Second Street, was destroyed by fire. In total, four buildings were damaged in the \$25,000 fire. The bakery was originally owned by John G. Staudenmayer. The Commercial Hotel and the Ruthenian Hall were heavily damaged. (01-01-1918) Monessen News

Frank Roman, age 39, and Mike Bennett, age 40, died as a result of an explosion at the Pittsburgh Steel Open Hearth on January 5, 1918. Another ten men were injured. (01-08-1918) Monessen News

Fisfis Brothers, the milk and ice cream dealers on Schoonmaker Avenue, have added groceries to their line. (01-11-1918) Daily Independent

W. S. Bumbaugh, President of the Monessen Foundry and Machine Company, was elected President of the Monessen Savings and Trust Company. (01-18-1918) Monessen News

Jules Albert will open a grocery and meat store at 910 Knox Avenue and will do a strictly cash business. (01-22-1918) Daily Independent

An application was made in the Court of Common Pleas to charter a new corporation to be known as the Italian Citizens Political Association. (01-25-1918) Monessen News

Philip Shepler, of 26 Linden Avenue, passed away on January 23, 1918 at the age of 81. He was formerly one of Rostraver Township's farmers. He moved to Monessen in 1902. (01-24-1918) Daily Independent

Nine coal cars at the Monessen Coal & Coke Company (old Iron City Mine) jumped the track at the tipple curve, after a hitching broke. Two men, Samuel Fox, of Charleroi, and Jacob Savo, of Monessen, were badly hurt. (01-26-1918) Daily Independent

Several people were discovered unconscious by police from escaping sewer gas after breaking down the door at the Laska Building, at the corner of Schoonmaker and Seneca Street. (01-26-1918) Daily Independent Late Autumn and early Winter Weddings and Engagements of 1917-1918

Dan's Archives

Monessen's new \$175,000 Municipal Building, at the corner of Third and Donner, was dedicated ninety years ago, on December 29, 1927. It was estimated that 10,000 visitors passed through the doors to inspect the new city quarters. Due to the large number of guests, the dedication services were held on Third Street. Mayor Woodward accepted the building on behalf of the citizens of Monessen. Superintendent of Parks and Public Property, John G. Check made a brief address, as he handed the property over to the Mayor. The Fireman's Band played the Star Spangled Banner, and the American flag was raised to the top of the flagpole.

Retiring Councilman, James A. Watkins was presented with a white gold watch and chain. He thanked the donors with tears in his eyes.

Greensburg Attorney, Roberty W. Smith gave the dedication address commenting on the progressive spirit of the town. Following the address, the public was entertained with a short concert, as visitors inspected the new building. Inside the building, potted plants and palms were arranged, along with bouquets of roses on the desks and tables.

In the evening, visiting local fire departments paraded through the streets in their motor vehicles.

The Greater Monessen Historical Society has designated the Monessen Municipal Building as our "Historic Building of 2017."
