Monessen's Catholic heritage goes back to 1900 and the founding of St. Leonard's Church, which was built to serve the Irish Catholic population of the new borough. The other churches were: Most Holy Name of Jesus (Slovak), St. Cajetan (Italian), St. Hyacinth (Polish) and St. Anthony (Croatian). 
Annual Donner Family Message to GMHS and the City of Monessen

Max Janavitz, manager of the Luna Theatre, announces he has installed a new curtain and machines, as well as repainted the interior and exterior. (05-05-1916) Daily Independent

S. C. Helzlsouer, the proprietor of the Union Hotel, the largest in the city, will install marble steps to the second floor, a tile floor in the office, and corridor with a drinking fountain. He will spend over \$1000 on fixtures for the first floor toilet and add six rooms to the building. (05-05-1916) Daily Independent

Workmen are building a foot bridge over the P&L.E. railroad tracks at Fourth Street for the use of mill employees. (05-09-1916) Daily Independent

The Monessen High School Mandolin Club gave its first annual concert with proceeds going to the high school library. (05-20-1916) Daily Independent

John Check has opened a new furniture store in the Independent Building on Sixth Street. (05-20-1916) Daily Independent

Thirty-three seniors received diplomas from Superintendent H. E. Gress. The eighteen female seniors wore white gowns and carried bouquets of pink roses. (06-01-1916) Daily Independent

Mr. Shertzinger, of Morgantown, has purchased the Luna Theatre. (06-08-1916) Daily Independent

Louis Stephens will erect a two story brick building at the corner of Fourth and Schoonmaker after tearing down the frame structure. The new building will adjoin the one erected last summer and form one block. Both will be used by the Eisenberg clothing establishment. (06-10-1916) Daily Independent

A petition will be presented to the Court of Common Pleas of Westmoreland County to form a corporation to be known as the "Greek Orthodox Church of Monessen". (06-10-1916) Daily Independent

Thomas Brown, of North Belle Vernon, has purchased the farm from the estate of the late William Manown east of town. Mr. Brown paid \$1,000 an acre. He expects to have it surveyed and laid out in town lots. (06-15-1916) Daily Independent

A two hundred and ten year old oak tree was cut down on the Julian Racy lot that had been admired since the early days of the town. Efforts were made to save the dying tree, but it finally gave way to the ravishes of age. (06-14-1916) Daily Independent

A powerful gas explosion wrecked the real estate and foreign departments of the Monessen Savings and Trust Company, at 500 Donner Avenue. Papers, typewriters, desks and chairs were scattered, and two large plate glass windows were knocked into the street. (07-10-1916) Daily Independent
