The former Miss Rebie Cook, of Cincinnati, was a beauty, who won the heart of a widowed war hero. ### **Monessen Synagogue Closes**

Temple Beth Am held its final service and disbanded, due to an aging and dwindling congregation. Membership dropped to below twenty families. Monessen Jews formed the Keneseth Israel Congregation in the early years of the twentieth century and built a synagogue on Schoonmaker Avenue. In 1952, ground was broken on Watkins Street for the present building. It was the last Jewish synagogue in the Mon Valley area. The building is currently for sale. The Historical Society will preserve the history of Monessen’s Jewish heritage. Anyone wishing to donate items or photos are asked to contact the Heritage Museum.

### **Cookbook Recipe**

#### **Summer Zucchini**

- 2 med. Zucchini, cut into ¼ in. slices**
- 1 tsp. salt**
- ¼ tsp. pepper**
- ¾ tsp. dried basil leaves**
- ¾ tsp. dried oregano**
- ½ tsp. garlic, minced**
- 6 slices bacon, cooked crisp & crumpled**
- 2 med. Tomatoes, cut into ½ in. slices**
- 1 lg. sweet onion, sliced thin**
- 1 c. (4 oz.) grated Swiss cheese**

Arrange zucchini in a 2 ½ quart casserole. Sprinkle with 1/3 of the salt, pepper, basil, oregano, and garlic. Add tomatoes and more of the seasonings. Top with onions and remaining seasonings. Cover and bake at 400 degrees for 30 minutes. Uncover and add cheese and bacon. Bake for 10 minutes longer until cheese is melted.

## **One Hundred Years ago in the newspapers May to July, 1919**

**The Star Theatre, on Sixth Street, caught fire on May 15, 1919. The blaze began in the third story under the roof. The fire caused \$5000 in damage, but W. A. McShaffrey, the owner, carried no insurance on the 46 x 100 ft. building. (05-16-1919) Daily Independent**

**The seventh annual contest between members of the Shakespearean and**

**Tennysonian Literary Societies will be in the High School auditorium on May 16, 1919. (05-16-1919) Daily Independent**

**The Wayman A. M. E. Church will celebrate their annual Educational Day on May 18, 1919 by featuring Professor Gilbert H. Jones, Ph.D., who is considered the best African American scholar of the day. He is the author of a Greek text book used in the Yale curriculum. (05-17-1919) Daily Independent**

**The Daily Independent has installed a Duplex Flat Bed Web Press, which will print six thousand papers per hour. It uses rolls of paper that are four miles long, instead of individual sheets, as in the old cylinder press. The press occupies a 12 x 16 ft. floor space and weighs 24,000 pounds. (05-21-1919) Daily Independent**

**Monessen High School will graduate thirty-eight students, the largest class ever. (05-27-1919) Daily Independent**

**Five hundred Greek and Italian residents of Monessen have left within the past two months to return to their native countries. It is believed they are carrying a half million dollars. (05-28-1919) Daily Independent**

**Dr. T. B. Herron purchased an X Ray machine with the Coolidge Tube for fluoroscopic and radiographic work. It is the only one of its kind in the city. (05-28-1919) Daily Independent**

**The well-known confectionery store of Miklarius and Berbatis, which is also known as the Palace of Sweets, was sold to James Lukis and John Morris. The firm was established in 1905. (05-31-1919) Daily Independent**

**Agnes Marshall, of Monessen, conducted an investigation and discovered her husband, Harold M. Corbine, had married Madeline Howard, of Chicago, in 1911, and herself, in 1912, when he called himself, Russell Gaut. After deserting Miss Marshall, he then married Miss Grace E. Harvel, of Pittsburgh. He was arrested and pled guilty. (06-11-1919) Daily Independent**

**The Board of Directors of the Pittsburgh Steel Company will erect one hundred new homes on the seven acres of the McMahan**

Homestead, as well as in Allenport. It is thought the McMahan homestead homes will be built of concrete. (06-11-1919) Daily Independent

A band of gypsies, headed by Maori, the Queen of Zealand, has been camping on the old carnival grounds near the Charleroi Monessen Bridge. She secured a license to place a tent on the vacant lot on Donner Avenue between Fourth and Fifth Streets to conduct a phrenologist's séance in her scant attire of colored garments. For a payment of a small sum, she would read the bumps on the head to tell the past, present and future. Two additional royal queens soon opened for business. The Police Chief ordered the royal court to move back to the bridge. (06-12-1919) Daily Independent

Two separate boy scout troops were organized for the children of employees of the Pittsburgh Steel Products Company. Z. C. Baudoux will be the scout master and be assisted by A. W. Blackburn and O. W. Sadler, Jr. (06-20-1919) Monessen News

Monessen's Welcome Home for the soldiers of the Great War and Fourth of July Celebration was held with intense heat and beautiful decorations, including a magnificent arch on Donner Avenue at Fifth Street. The foreign societies of the town constructed floats for a parade that moved along Donner to Oneida, then to Schoonmaker to Tenth, Tenth to Donner and to Electric Park for the speakers. It is estimated that twelve thousand people were in Electric Park or Page Park for the fireworks, with thousands others on the hills and the viaduct. (07-05-1919) Daily Independent

Henry and Minerva Turner, the pioneer African American residents of the city, have sold their home on McMahan Avenue and will return to Virginia after twenty years. (07-18-1919) Daily Independent

The newspaper reported that powdered milk will be found on the kitchen shelf. (07-22-1919) Monessen News

The Gibsonton Distillery will close down on August 1, 1919, due to prohibition. The distillery was built in 1856-1857. At one time as many as 100,000 barrels were stored in the warehouses. (07-26-1919) Daily Independent

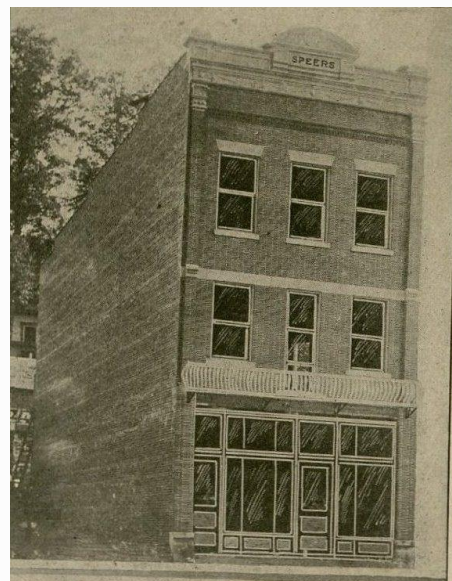

### **A Look Back**



**Speers Building Demolished**

**As Monessen is forced to demolish historic buildings in their business district that are slowly collapsing, we continue to look at the stories behind the structures, although in some cases, records are lacking or missing. In October of 2017, the one hundred and**

fifteen year old Speers Building, at 550 Donner Avenue, suffered a roof and structural collapse, following heavy rain storms. During the spring of 2019, the city began emergency demolition of the historic structure that was located next to the former Citizen's National Bank.

The building was opened for business in November of 1902, with the Miller Carpet and Wall Paper Company as the first tenant, boasting 32,000 rolls of wall paper in stock. By March of 1904, the business was gone, and E. A. Daniels Drug Company was opening their store for business. Again, in two years, in mid-1906, it had become Thatcher's Drug Store.

In 1913, Druggist Guy R. Eddy, was celebrating the opening of his Rubber Goods Dept. at 550 Donner Avenue with free candy for the ladies, free cigars for the men and free rubber balloons for the children. Eddy also served Reick's Ice Cream at his soda fountain and stressed its purity, and quality, along with his up to date service.

In 1920, Eddy was advertising, through his drug store, opportunities to purchase a share in three wells for \$100 near Olympia Park, through the "Good Faith Oil and Gas Company". By 1921, he was having a "Drug Store Cash Removal Sale" with rubber goods selling at 33 1/3 percent off. He was moving his business to the First National Bank Building opposite the P&LE depot.

In September of 1922, the Boston Store was opening in the location as Monessen's new bargain citadel. Ladies flannelette gowns were selling for sixty-five cents each. The Boston Store sold their lease in January of 1925 and began a Quitting Business Sale. The ad said rather than transport the merchandise to Donora, they will have unheard of prices offered.

In March of 1925, Hirsch's, the only exclusive women's and children's shoe store in western Pennsylvania opened. They advertised short, vamp, French toe pumps. However, by May of 1926, Hirsch's vacated the building, and William Sklov purchases the stock of Moss Brothers Company at 461 Donner and moved it into 550 Donner for a receiver's sale. Items advertised included watches, jewelry, silverware, cut glass, ivory ware, cutlery, fire arms, leather goods, sporting goods and musical instruments. Following the sale, the Vogue Jewelry Store opened, but by March of 1927, the business was having a sheriff's sale.

In October of 1927, the Salvation Army opened a fund drive using 550 Donner

Avenue as the headquarters for the drive. Their goal was to collect \$3,500 for the needy of Monessen, Charleroi, Donora and Monongahela.

D. Sober opened the Newark Shoe Store Company in March of 1928. They advertised \$4 shoes and a free pair of hosiery for the grand opening. A year later, in March of 1929, it had become the Shoe Factory Outlet Store.

In April of 1930, the G & G Clothes Shop opened selling "a new standard of clothes" showcasing smartness, finer quality and greater value. They had a complete line of men's hats, shirts, ties, underwear and hosiery. However, by September, they were closing and Labow's Store was moving there from Fourth and Donner. The building was listed at this time as owned by Dr. Day.

Labow's operated at 550 Donner Avenue until 1941, after which Agnes's Shoppe, the Milady Store, opened. They stayed until 1963, when they moved down the block.

In early 1964, the executive offices of the Park Holding Company, owned by Mayor Hugo Parente and his associates, renovated the building for their use. At this time, it was listed as being owned by the estate of Henry and Rose Cramer. In 1968, the Civic Finance Service, Inc. purchased the firm and began giving loans. In 1972, in the upstairs rooms, F. Pillitteri, M.S. W. announced the opening of an office to provide psychotherapy and marital counseling.

Later, Lucas Floral would move into the building, before it was left empty for many years.

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
