Re-enactors from the 11th P.V.I. Company K, Inc. and the 11th Pennsylvania Reserve Infantry Company F will set up authentic Civil War camps to showcase a living history view of camp life during the War of the Rebellion.

The festival will include food vendors, booths, local authors, displays and family fun, along with great photo opportunities.

There will be an opening ceremony at 12 noon at the new Monessen Amphitheatre.

View displays of Civil War relics, cooking demonstrations over open fires, fife music, demonstrations of encampment, soldier life, their equipment, tents and uniforms, as well as children's activities.

Living History Schedule for August 15:

Soldier drills: 11 AM, 1 PM, 3 PM., include inspection of arms, loading in 9 times, firing by company, file and rank.

Children's activities: Immediately following Soldier Drills will include drilling with the soldiers using wooden guns, demonstrating the accuracy of Civil War bullets using round and spherical balls, old time games and Victorian dress up for photos. Don't forget your camera. Two musical groups have been scheduled to perform in the amphitheatre for Founders Day: "Bearfoot Neighbors" from 1-2 PM and "Hear Tonight" from 2-3 PM.



Save 500 Donner, Create a Music Center

Matt Shorraw, a young volunteer and the author of the new Monessen book by Arcadia Publishing, is attempting the save the old Monessen Savings and Trust Company Building at 500 Donner. The historic building was once home to the A&P Grocery Company, Thrift Drug and Health Mart. Currently, it is being targeted for demolition by the city.

Matt's message:

"Much of the historic architecture in the downtown area has been demolished, or is falling apart. There is a building in the heart of the downtown district that is crying out to be saved. This building known as '500 Donner Ave.' was a former bank, in Beaux Arts style. It was converted into offices and retail, with an auditorium on the third floor. It has been vacant for nearly 30 years, along with the majority of the once bustling street that it stands on.

The building is being threatened, as certain city politicians want to see it demolished for another vacant lot (the city has innumerable vacant lots, more than it can take care of, or afford). I would like to acquire the building from the city with the funds raised for this campaign. Once the building is acquired, I would like to begin to renovate it and restore it. After the renovation is complete, I would like to convert the first floor into a café where live, original music can be played, the second floor into offices and a music center that would offer lessons and classes, and the third floor into an auditorium which is the use that it once served. Students from the music center could perform in the auditorium, as well as other local musicians. Since there is not much business in the downtown area, there is not a venture like this one in the city of Monessen, nor are there any places in the immediate area that hold all of these things in one building.

It is my hope that something like this will inspire the youth of Monessen and the surrounding communities. I hope to get them involved in music and their community, and to keep them off the streets. The music lessons would be structured so that children and their families that can afford to pay, do so, and those who cannot afford to pay, as long as they put in the work, will be offered free lessons. The youth in the city desperately need somewhere like this to go, and I hope to provide that for them. It is also my hope that this building will become a centerpiece for the city and for its downtown, and that it will spark business and inspiration in the community.

I hope you can help me make this a reality, before this beautiful structure is lost forever!"
