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### Tim Donner Joins Us!

Tim Donner, great grandson of William Henry Donner, has accepted a seat on the Greater Monessen Historical Society's Heritage Museum Board of Directors as an Honorary Member. Tim said he is pleased to join our group, and we are glad to have him. Tim visited us for Founder's Day at the invitation of Dan Zyglowicz and was very interested in Monessen. We took him on a tour of the City. He visited the Donner Home on Parkway and was delighted to see the former Tin Plant office building at the Kopper's site. His great grandfather, William Henry Donner, was the founder of the National Tin Plate Company, Monessen's first industry. Tim was the guest of honor at two receptions. The first one for invited guests was at the Heritage Museum where he saw the exhibit, "Founding Fathers and Early Monessen" and visited the new second floor library and archives areas. He graciously donated three photographs of his great grandfather for our collection. The second reception was held in cooperation with Monessen Public Library and District Center and hosted by the Friends of the Library Tim toured the Public Library and was very impressed by the facility. The Heritage Museum happily counts Tim Donner as a good friend.



#### Spring ethnic display planned

2009 marks the centennial of the former St. Hyacinth Polish Church and its women's Rosary Society in Monessen. Even though St. Hyacinth was merged along with the four other ethnic Roman Catholic churches to form the Epiphany of the Lord Parish, it is a time to celebrate the Polish contributions in the Mon Valley. Dorothy Jozwiak wants to mark this milestone by coordinating a Polish exhibit for the months of March, April and May. The theme is "Monessen Polish Heritage". Do you have Polish souvenirs, photographs or items that tell the story of the Polish Americans who built Hyacinth's Church or the Sacred Heart of Jesus Polish National Church? May we borrow them? The exhibit is tentatively slated to open Sunday, March 8, 2009.

#### **Museum Closed for Winter**

The Heritage Museum is closed for the winter months of January & February, but work continues behind the scenes. Madeline Dudas has stepped forward and volunteered to work on the cataloging of the many local historical objects donated to the collection. Assisting Madeline are Sara Villarreal, our Douglas Education Center student worker, Sylvia Spadafore and Maggie Franceschi, both of the Lifelong Learning program. The objects are being entered into the PastPerfect computer system.

#### Library and Archives Opens

On Founder's Day, September 13, 2008, the Heritage Museum opened the renovated Library and Archives Area on the second floor of the Museum. The Library contains furniture and shelving from the old Monessen High School library. Over the fireplace mantel in the room is the clock that once hung in the former Monessen Post Office. Next to it is a photograph of Colonel Charles Derickson, bodyguard to President Abraham Lincoln and Monessen Postmaster. The book shelves contain volumes donated to the Museum that cover ethnic studies, local and Pennsylvania history and genealogy. Over the shelving are photos of Monessen's founders. Monessen Public Library and District Center has cooperated with us in cataloging all the books to be part of the new Polaris Westmoreland Library Network, Access PA, and OCLC. Thanks to Monessen Library, people all over the world can now see what books are available in the Heritage Museum.

The archives hold all the Monessen memorabilia donated to the Heritage Museum. We have recently gathered the boxes stored all over the Museum and consolidated them in this one area for processing. Madeline Dudas, Donnis Headley and other volunteers are working to input the items into the PastPerfect software system. Our goal is to set up a webpage to make the holdings available to all.

The final area on the second floor is the Gallery, which encompasses the stairwell and long hall of the former boarding house. Joshua Fox and Gary Strelick spent many hours hanging large photographs, plaques, sketches, charters and maps pertaining to the history of the Greater Monessen area. We encourage the public to stop by and visit. We have installed a chair lift for those unable to use the stairs.

#### Founder's Day

Our annual Founder's Day celebration was held on Saturday, September 13, 2008 as we commemorated the 110th anniversary of Monessen's founding. The event took months to plan and was a group effort with everyone working together. We organized food and informational booths along Donner Avenue, as well as sidewalk sales and church tours. As stated earlier, Tim Donner visited and was presented with an official City Proclamation by

Mayor Anthony Petaccia. The Heritage Museum was also pleased to host Bud Shuster, grandson of A.N. Shuster, Monessen's third burgess. In honor of the festivities, the Greater Monessen Historical Society received letters of congratulations from President George W. Bush, Governor Edward Rendell and the law firm of Reed Smith LLP. Reed Smith is the worldwide law firm based in Pittsburgh originally started by Philander Knox and Judge James Reed, two of Monessen's founders. To conclude our Founder's weekend celebration, there was a cooking demonstration by Rizzi DeFabo in our new kitchen. Thank you to all who visited, helped us in any way or participated in our activities. Once again we stress, no one person is responsible for our events, it is a volunteer undertaking involving many individuals!

# A look back to the opening months of 1909 as seen in our newspapers

In January of 1909, the Monessen News reported the new Third Ward School will be ready for occupancy by February 1. One hundred and sixty pupils will be transferred from the Baptist Church building and the old Third Ward building into 4 of the 8 available rooms.

The Citizens' English School for Adult Foreigners teaches the English language, facts of American history and American ways to all creeds and nationalities. Thirty three students are presently enrolled.

On January 17, the cornerstone of the new Monessen Turn Verein Hall at Second and Donner will be laid. The building cost \$30,000 to build, and George Hogg of Braddock was the contractor. There are 350 members. Burgess F. H. Shutterly will make the opening address. Mr. Ellsworth Dean of Pittsburgh is the architect.

Page Woven Wire Fence Company has created a flag pole for the Iowa School at Oneida and Schoonmaker. The pole is 53 ft. high. The crew consisted of W. A. Darrah, Charles Crouse, Clint Horner, J. M. Anderson, Howard Heilman, Clyde Geiger, Homer Beistel, Bert Baker, Robert Lowry, C. B. Kelly, John Beall, M. A. Dougherty, and Charles Crouch.

Thaddeus Kisor moved into his new \$11,000 mansion on the Manown place, between Monessen and Belle Vernon. The house is of the old English style built on the cottage plan with one upstairs room.

The Jeffersonian Literary Society at the High School held a debate on woman's suffrage with Ethel Gantt and Regina Conway, affirmative and Morse Ney and Adam Horn, negative. The cause of suffrage was defeated.

B. E. Brown, the jeweler, has applied for a street clock making patent and may start a new business.

William Howard Taft, the incoming President, has selected Philander C. Knox as his Secretary of State. The Luna Theatre promises to show the Taft Inauguration.

Colonel James M. Schoonmaker, vice president of the Pittsburgh & Lake Erie Railroad, will represent Pennsylvania at the Taft Inaugural Ball.

In mid February, the following entertainment was available at the Monessen theaters:

Luna Theatre -- "Guerilla Warfare", a movie covering General Sherman and the Civil War. This will be followed by a movie dealing with the assassination of Pres. Lincoln and the capture of John Wilkes Booth.

Bijou Theatre – De Mars Sisters Vaudeville, Mr. Severen, pantomimist, 'Incriminating Evidence' moving picture and two comedies.

Monessen Opera House – Golden Crook Burlesque with twenty five pretty girls, "Sirezona", "Fiddle De Roll" and a pie eating contest.


Star Theatre - Elks Minstrel Show.

Monessen Theatre – the play, "How hearts are broken", Vaudeville, Mortimus Bassett, imitator, Moe Tipton, songs, Halls Trained Dogs and a motion picture.

### DAN'S ARCHIVES

We are celebrating the bicentennial of the birth of President Abraham Lincoln during the year 2009. Many people have forgotten that Monessen has its own link to President Lincoln. The second postmaster of Monessen, Colonel Charles M. Derickson, was one of Lincoln's bodyguards.

Colonel Derickson was born in Meadville and enlisted in the One Hundred Fiftieth Regiment of Pa Volunteers at the start of the War of the Rebellion. When his father became captain of Lincoln's bodyguard detail, Charles became a guard as well.

In later years, Derickson recalled Lincoln enjoyed visiting the "Soldier's House" that served as his summer presidential residence for "a cup of Army coffee and a plate of beans". He would sit and talk with the men, inquiring as to their complaints of Army life. Derickson's father, David, became a close confidant of Lincoln during the war. On the night Lincoln was assassinated, Colonel Derickson was on guard duty a block from Ford's Theater. It was he who galloped to the White House carrying word that the President had been shot.

Following the war, Charles Derickson opened a general store in Pardo, after which he had a hardware store in Mercer. It was in Mercer that he married Kathryne Smith Carter. With the founding of Monessen by the East Side Land Company, he moved his business to the growing new town. He settled in a home at 653 McKee Avenue. After selling the hardware store, it

became the Monessen Hardware Company. Derickson then became postmaster and served for four years, during which time he was known for advancing the interests of the town. He became an official in the Presbyterian Church, a Shriner, a Knight Templar and an Elk.

Colonel Derickson would be called upon to speak to students at Lincoln's Birthday ceremonies at Monessen's Jefferson High School. In honor of Lincoln's centennial in 1909, Derickson was the guest of honor and speaker at ceremonies held at the California Normal School (California University of PA) in the Chapel of Old Main. Charles Derickson passed away on May 14, 1912 from heart ailments and was buried in Mercer.

#### A word about donations

Donations come in three major forms: those who give monetary contributions, those who write memories or genealogies or give memorabilia, and those who give time to keep the GMHS operations moving toward our goals and preserving our mission. The last five months have been a season of growing, caring and giving. **Thank you!** 

As we express our appreciation to donors like you, who choose to care about preserving the history of the Greater Monessen area, we want to remind everyone what type of memorabilia we are looking to preserve. Following are a few general hints for contributing your memorabilia:

Do save documents, artifacts, photos, and items of potential **local historical or ethnic value**, especially if they are rare or unique.

Do save documents that have been personalized in some manner, such as with a person's name or a place name.

Do pack materials in appropriate packaging to ensure they arrive at GMHS in good condition.

If you are uncertain about the suitability of an item for the GMHS Archives, err on the side of history. Don't second-guess whether an item may be of historical value. When in doubt, bring it in.

#### Leaving a Legacy

When doing estate planning, consider including the GMHS in your will. We are honored to have you as friends during your lifetime, but think about how much you could continue to do for us after you're gone. We are truly grateful to those who provide for the Society's future.

Starting with this issue, the newsletter now has a new updated format, and I will be serving as your editor. We will publish the newsletter four times a year, Feb., May, Aug., and Nov. Thank you. Dan Zyglowicz
