#### G. C. Murphy 5 & 10

In 2010, the Westmoreland County "One Book, One Community" reading program will feature Jason Togyer's new book, "For the Love of Murphy's". It is a history of the McKeesport-based G. C. Murphy Company, which operated five and ten cent stores throughout the region. Our research shows the Murphy Company purchased the J. K. Skelley Store at 265 Donner Avenue and reopened it as a G. C. Murphy 5 and 10 on June 7, 1902. The store later relocated to between 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> Streets and remained in business until the early 1970's. We are searching for photos and Murphy items for a small exhibit to coincide with the county book program. We also want to hear from former Murphy employees.

#### **Civil War Anniversary**

The 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the beginning of the War of the Rebellion or Civil War will be observed with great ceremony starting in April of 2011. Our own Colonel James M. Schoonmaker, a highly decorated veteran of the conflict, was the Chairman of Pennsylvania's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary commemorations of the Battle of Gettysburg in 1913. He was later selected as Pennsylvania's Outstanding Civil War veteran. Westmoreland County has asked the historical societies to begin gathering photos and memorabilia of the war for their own exhibits. Do you have ancestors who fought the war? Look for Civil War items and photographs you can loan to the Heritage Museum. Call and let us know what you have.

#### One Hundred Years ago in the newspapers February-April, 1910

Monessen School Board authorized a \$60,000 bond issue to build either an addition to the Iowa Building or a new school building to relieve overcrowded conditions. At present, eighteen rooms had fifty or more pupils with one room having eighty-eight pupils.

The new First Baptist Church Building near Sixth and Schoonmaker will be dedicated. Total cost was approx. \$20,000.

The Bijou Theatre says increased attendance shows that moving pictures are gaining in favor with audiences. Price is five cents.

William McShaffrey and L. L. Reeves have purchased two lots on Donner Avenue near Ninth Street and will soon build an automotive showroom. Only the Mitchell car will be sold and have a capacity of twenty vehicles to display.

After much debate, Monessen school directors purchased eight lots from the East Side Land Company on Linden Avenue for \$5,060 and will erect the new school on the property.

A. J. McGinness of 464 Reed Avenue, secured a patent on March 3, 1910 for an improved rolling mill for seamless tube. He is the foreman roll turner on the No.1 rod mill at the Pittsburgh Steel Company.

William Henry Donner visited Monessen on March 3, and said he was well pleased with its development.

John M. Beall was chosen as the architect for the new school building.

Colonel Charles M. Derickson, Chairman of the Shade Tree Committee announced that at least four hundred Norway Maple trees will be planted this spring.

Mr. and Mrs. John Taylor of 125 McKee Avenue celebrated their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary on March 15, 1910. They are living with their married daughter, Mrs. George Pourney.

J. A. Sheetz, owner of the Sheetz Hotel, has bought the Deaterly Farm in Rostraver Twp. From Carl Garoncy for \$10,000 cash. It has one hundred acres and will be his summer home.

Miss Nelle McMahan, daughter of the late Alexander McMahan, has copyrighted a waltz, entitled "The Song of the Night Wind".

The Grand Hotel will be sold to P. M. Dwyer. Current owner, W. H. Schuyler is retiring.

The Westmoreland Hotel of Monessen has been listed as the official hotel for autoists.

Daniel Stevens, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George H. Stevens, of 30 Reed Avenue, celebrated his eleventh birthday on April 14, 1910.

George Nash will begin construction on a two-story brick building at the corner of Sixth and Schoonmaker.

The school children of the McKinley and Jefferson Schools will march to Sixth Street Park on April 22, 1910 for a tree planting ceremony. Each room will plant one tree after a short address from the Civic Committee.

The Sicilian Society will present a Passion play called, "The Redemption of Adam" in the Opera House. The play will be in the Italian language and have a cast of fifty.

The alleys of the Capitol Bowling room are being removed to convert the space into a new nickelodeon. Proprietor, F. L. Blackmore said the new theatre will be called the Liberty Theatorium and seat over 300 persons with one of the largest screens in the city.

The Afro American voters of Monessen and McMahan Boroughs have formed an organization called the Afro American Protective Club. The purpose is to unite all Afro American voters of the communities into one body and improve their industrial, financial, and political conditions. Walter Spriggs is President.

John Barrett, craneman for the Pittsburgh Steel Company and Miss Ethel Shaner of Monongahela were married March 2, 1910 in Washington, PA.



# **Dan's Archives**



### A Pre-Presidential Visit

The Monessen Board of Trade (Chamber of Commerce) announced that Senator Warren G. Harding, the former Governor of Ohio and a likely presidential candidate would deliver the keynote speech at their tenth annual banquet on February 17, 1920. Senator Harding agreed to leave the debate in the United States Senate over the possible adoption of the Treaty of Versailles, which had ended the Great War, to deliver his speech in Monessen.

The Ladies Aid group of the Presbyterian Church would serve a four course turkey dinner in the Monessen High School Gymnasium to four hundred guests. Three hundred pounds of turkey were purchased. The organization also agreed to loan their dishes and silverware. Patriotic decorations and flags were placed inside the gymnasium. Tickets were sold for \$1.75 each. Placards were hung on which the mottoes and ambitions of the Board of Trade were printed.

Representatives of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad, the Pittsburgh Steel Company, the American Sheet and Tin Plate Company, Carnegie Steel, Page Steel and Wire Fence Company, the City of Pittsburgh and the county seat of Greensburg sent word that they would be present. West Newton, Donora, Charleroi, Belle Vernon, and Monongahela also sent representation. Colonel James M. Schoonmaker arranged for special trains and cars to bring the important industrial officials of Pittsburgh to Monessen. The Colonel unfortunately was unable to attend personally due to a cold. The newspaper stressed that both men and women would be admitted to the balcony to hear the speech with the understanding that smoking would be permitted in the banquet room below. The Louhi orchestra played patriotic music, and an Afro-American quartet from Pittsburgh provided singing. A. N. Shuster, retiring president of the Board of Trade was host and called the program to order. Louis X. Ely was chosen as toastmaster.

Harding spoke on "Problems Senator the of Reconstruction" for over an hour. He stated, "The first essential of reconstruction is to get back to the safe paths of the federal constitution. We have gone far afield from its safeguards, since the world was plunged in war. The next great essential is to come to a realization and appreciation of what made us what we are, so that we may cling to our boasted liberties, our opportunities and go on to greater accomplishment and attending eminence. The third essential is to free the republic and its citizens and the activities of the people from wartime We talked democracy and established burdens. bureaucracy and crowned it all with autocracy. It is vital to make sure that we hold fast to representative democracy, which we of America have proven to be the one dependable form of popular government, which the world has witnessed. We must, of course, strive to get back to approximately normal conditions. We shall never witness the old order again. We shall never again know a federal government with its indirect taxes unconsciously paid. We shall never again know a national expense account of less than three billions. There must be reformed administration and forced economics and persistent avoidance of waste and extravagance to get down to three billion. But it must be done. High cost of government is the first cause of high cost of living. Business burdened heavily met the strain patriotically for war, but it cannot go on and succeed in peace. I do not believe we can live our best at the present pace. We are beyond a safe speed limit. We must hold America eminent in industry and trade. No nation ever wrote a brilliant page in history except in commercial eminence. It is a reflux of the people's prosperity. Our one valid asset out of war's expenditures is ten million tons of They are ample to form the greatest ocean ships. merchant marine in the world. We can do it by selling to Americans to operate under the American flag. They are a loss under government ownership but may be turned to profit and an agency of good fortune under the efficiency of private enterprise. We must ever be independently and confidentially American, keepers of the American conscience ourselves, and thus made strong and free to act and play a great nation's part in the progress of the world".

Senator Harding would become the Republican Presidential candidate and go on to win the Election of 1920. Three years later, under the cloud of the Teapot Dome Scandal, he died suddenly in San Francisco, while on vacation with his wife. Calvin Coolidge would become President as the Roaring Twenties geared up.
