As you can see by the photo at the left, the Milsom Building needs some attention, before we can begin using it as the annex for the Heritage Museum. The roof needs replaced along with the windows. The building needs power washed and repainted. The front entrance needs redone and one of the show windows has cracked. There is a structural issue that needs addressed on the alley side. Inside, the electrical and heating systems need replaced. The second floor apartments are a sight! © The Heritage Museum belongs to all of you and needs your help to proceed with renovations to the annex. To achieve this purpose, it was suggested to start a separate building fund for the former Milsom Store building. Several special friends of the Greater Monessen Historical Society have already donated towards this purpose. We ask the rest of you to consider making whatever contribution you are able and mark it as for the building fund. A "Buy a Window Campaign" has been set up. There are 15 windows on the second floor. The Milsom Building sits at probably the most prominent corner in downtown Monessen, directly across from the old Monessen Savings and Trust Building. When sitting in traffic at the red light, it is the first building anyone sees. Do you want it to continue to look like this, or do you want it restored to the appearance it had when it housed the Endicott Johnson Shoe Store? We hope to transform this corner into a space appealing to anyone driving through the town. Please be generous.

Monessen Memories Cookbook

Thanks to everyone who has purchased a copy of the "Monessen Memories" cookbook. To date we have sold 134 copies. We have received many compliments, and several people have said they are shipping them to relatives who live out of state. Copies are \$18. The book contains many of the recipes that belonged to the generation of immigrants, who first settled the Greater Monessen area in the late 1800's and early 1900's. Susanna Swade is planning an afternoon of cooking demonstrations using the recipes found in the book sometime in the spring. Here is a sample recipe:

Hrutka (Easter Cheese)

15 eggs 3 c. milk ½ c. sugar 1 c. raisins (opt.) ½ tsp. vanilla

Soak raisins in water. Remove any stems. Beat eggs well. Add to milk, sugar and raisins. Cook over medium high heat stirring constantly with a wooden flat spatula to prevent burning. Mixture will form lumps. Milk will settle in pan and eggs are cooked. Line a colander with a clean dish towel or cheesecloth. Pour in egg mixture and drain. Chill in fridge. Anna Sinchak's recipe given by daughter, Regina Feryok.

One Hundred Years ago in the newspapers February-April, 1911

Sauerkraut candy is a new variety being made by the Philadelphia Candy Kitchen. (2-3-1911) DI

Johnson's Café, on the lower side of Sixth Street, will open to the public, according to the Johnson Brothers. A one story building with an English-looking front has been erected. It will have two small tables on either side of the entrance and a lunch counter surrounding a hot plate. The brothers started with a lunch wagon where the A. R. Ney showroom is now located. Later, the wagon moved to the lot on Sixth where the café building has been erected, and finally in a room above the Star Theatre. It will now be one door below the theater on Sixth. (2-3-1911) MN

St. Leonard's Roman Catholic Church will hold a sacred concert on Sunday night, February 26, to dedicate their new pipe organ. The organ is worth \$3000 and contains 628 pipes. (2-10-1911) MN

The Monessen Plumbing Company is expanding to take on a complete line of electric supplies and will now be known as Monessen Plumbing and Electric Company. (2-21-1911) MN

Jacob Kent, of Monessen, a veteran of the Civil War, died February 24, 1911 at age 72. He was a Monessen councilman and former employee of the Page Fence Company. (2-25-1911) DI

The Naturalization Committee of the Board of Trade is making a concerted effort to naturalize the foreign population. The greatest success has been among the Italian population. (3-10-11) MN

Improvements to the Monessen Brewery will result in an increase of capacity from 35,000 to 50,000 barrels annually. The renovations cost somewhere between \$10,000 and \$15,000, as the floor space was doubled along with adding a new soaking machine, bottling machine and pasteurizing machine. The brewery employs thirty men. (3-17-1911) MN

Pawnee Bill and Buffalo Bills Big West Show will perform at the Bijou Theatre on March 21, 1911. Instead of arriving by train, the show will come to Monessen on a street car. Admission is ten cents. (3-20-1911) DI

The funeral of Samuel Smock Houseman, of North Belle Vernon, took place on March 19, 1911. He was a member of Company F, First Pennsylvania Volunteer Cavalry, during the Civil War. Sgt. Houseman died of cancer of the ear. (3-20-1911) DI

J. G. Staudemayer, local baker, has been experimenting with his invention, a rotary turbine gasoline engine for automobiles or airplanes, and has applied for a patent. It weighs only 175 pounds and is expected to deliver 28 to 35 pounds of horsepower. (3-21-1911) MN

The newly erected Webster Methodist Episcopal Church will be dedicated on Sunday, March 26, 1911. The brick structure cost \$12,000 to build. (3-23-1911) DI

A Monessen choral club is being organized with Mrs. M. J. Cramer as president. They hope to prepare an Easter cantata. They will be known as the Monessen Choral Union. (3-28-1911) MN

Monessen Greeks have organized a 40 member brass band under the direction of the leader of the Italian band. (3-28-1911) MN

Liberty Day will be observed by Monessen's Greek community on Sunday, April 9, 1911. A parade will form in front of the Opera House and proceed to Donner Avenue as far as First Street. It will then go onto Schoonmaker, as far as Eleventh Street, then back to the Star Theatre where speakers will be heard. Hundreds of marchers are expected. (4-7-1911) DI

The Luna Theatre will be enlarged to accommodate 200 additional seats, along with a new front and electric sign with hundreds of electric lights. Nine entrances will be made during the remodeling. (4-11-1911) DI

C. L. Chester, of Monessen, has a patent on an agricultural sprayer he invented for spraying large orchards, vineyards, and gardens. It is being considered by numerous manufacturers. (4-21-1911) MN

Mrs. Anna McCarroll, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Conrad Schaulk, of Sixth Street and Park Way. She was the granddaughter of Lord McManus, on her mother's side, and the granddaughter of Lord Gellan, on her father's. She was born sixty five years ago in an Irish castle and had made her home in McKeesport. (4-21-1911) DI

A Greek Royal Visit

On March 4, 1911, His Imperial Highness, the Prince De Byzantium, Count of Vellus and Voedondous, Doctor of Laws, Heir of the Imperial Hellenic Roman House and Pretender of the Imperial Hellenic Roman Throne of Constantinople, Constantinos Palaeologos, visited Monessen on a speaking tour. His family was the oldest Imperial House of the world and traced its genealogy back four thousand years. They were the descendants of the Trojan kings and Roman Caesars. A Greek

welcoming committee comprised of Nick Berbatis, Peter Sotus, and Peter Loucalarakis escorted the Prince from the Grand Hotel in an automobile that was led by a brass band to the Star Theatre for his first lecture. The Theatre was crowded, and most of the lecture was delivered in the Greek language, but picture scenes of the ancient history and conflicts of Greece were shown on the screen.

The Prince advocates the union of all the Greek and Christian peoples, who belonged to the Byzantine Empire, along with assistance from all Christians to help free the Hellenes, Armenians, and Syrians, who are under the Ottoman Turkish yoke. He spoke of Turkish hordes daily killing Christians, and the snatching of Christian churches and schools that are then given to the enemy. He also said children and innocent women are wildly killed every day in Macedonia by the barbarian Turks, while the Greek Patriarch asks for Christian help to protect the cross and die for the faith and national rights.

The Prince delivered two lectures in the Star Theatre. Before leaving, he was treated to a tour of the Pittsburgh Steel Company by Superintendent George Nash.

In a letter sent to the Monessen Daily Independent upon his departure, the Prince said farewell to the "people of your poetic and healthy Monessen". He thanked everyone for the American hospitality. He concluded by stressing the need for protection and liberty to those under the Turkish yoke. He also said in the future, if the United States would find itself provoked, it would be the Greek children, who would protect the American borders.

In an editorial in the newspaper, the editor said the excellent lecture of the Prince should stimulate citizenship, as Monessen has many Greek businessmen and women, who strive to make a better town. It said his countrymen should strive to emulate his example, and his example should be an inspiration for the future.

During his stay, the Prince met in private with the leading Greek citizens of the town and advised them to enlarge their uniformed cadet force. He urged them to prepare in the case of an uprising between the Ottomans and the Greek government. Captain Gust Alexander had a force of sixty well drilled cadets, who were ready for immediate enlistment, if duty called. Following discussions with the Prince, he planned to enroll a force of two hundred members and adopt a new flag bearing the emblem of the Byzantium throne, along with new uniform buttons.

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
