



"Industrial Monessen" is theme of new exhibit

For the autumn exhibit, the Heritage Museum enlisted the services of retired Monessen art teacher. Dan Matta. He graciously volunteered to create displays looking back at Monessen's great industrial heritage. Monessen's first industry was William Henry Donner's National Tin Plate Company, which was the catalyst for starting the settlement of the town. Construction of the Tin Mill began in 1897 at the same time Mr. Donner built his twenty-five room home between Parkway and McKee. Within a few years, the Monessen Foundry and Machine Company, Page Woven Wire Fence Company, American Steel Hoop Company, Pittsburgh Steel Company, Monessen Brick Works, Monessen Box Company and the Monessen Brewing Company were employing thousands of immigrants, who flocked to work in the new mills. The mill that had started it all, the National Tin Plate Company, was sold by William Henry Donner to the American Sheet and Tin Plate Company just a couple of years after being built.

The "Industrial Monessen" Exhibit will be available until December 23, 2011. Anyone having any photos or items from the great industrial complexes that once lined Monessen's riverbank is asked to either loan or donate the material for use in the displays. As always, admission to the exhibits is FREE! Tell your friends and neighbors.

Monessen to observe special anniversary, Lisa Hays, of Westmoreland Historical Society to speak. Library time capsule to be opened. Cookie samples available

On September 16, 2011, Monessen will observe the 90th anniversary of changing from a borough form of government to a third class city form of government. The change happened in 1921 and resulted in the election of Carl Woodward as first Mayor of the City of Monessen. The Greater Monessen Historical Society is planning a celebration on Saturday, September 17, 2011. A flea market will be held in the old Milsom Building at 501 Donner Avenue from 10 AM until 3 PM. Donations of items are being accepted at the Heritage Museum during regular business hours. At the Museum, a special program will be held beginning at 10 AM. For a \$5.00 fee, a participant will visit various "Cookie Stations" and receive samples featured in the "Monessen Memories" cookbook. Each person will receive a dozen samples to eat or take home. At 10:30, a tape of Monessen opera star, Blanche Thebom, will be played showing her greatest triumphs on the stage. At 11:15, Lisa Hays, **Executive Director of the Westmoreland County** Historical Society, will speak. If you are unable to come in the morning, the cookie walk and the Thebom tape will be repeated starting at 1 PM. Janet Imbrescia, Vice President of the Monessen Public Library Board of Directors, will open the time capsule buried on the occasion of the Library's 60th anniversary in 1996. It will be a fun day filled with history and sweets.



Museum Shoppe



Collecting Genealogies and Memories

The Heritage Museum began collecting family histories and memories of growing up in Monessen a couple years ago. We urge anyone to deposit a copy of their family histories and photos with the Historical Society for preservation and inclusion in our archives. Recently, Jennie Melissas, former Monessen High School science teacher, donated a copy of a biography she and her niece, Katherine Pagonis Drew wrote about her late brother. Miss Melissas and her family generously allowed us to reprint it for our readers.



Nicholas "Mel" Melissas, was born in Monessen July 12, 1925. Mel was the second of the six children of Steve and Irene Melissas. There were three other boys: James (Cab), August (Augie), and Michael (Mehal). The two girls were Mary Pagonis (the oldest), and Jennie (the youngest).

Like many children of the Depression, Mel worked at odd jobs while growing up - he stoked the coal furnace for the Monessen library, set pins at the local bowling alley, and spent the summer months house painting with his father and brothers. He attended Monessen High School from which he graduated in 1943 as Valedictorian and recipient of the High Honors Plaque.

After high school, Mel enlisted in the Air Force but contracted tuberculosis before being deployed. He had a

long and arduous but total recovery in a military hospital in Asheville, NC.

After discharge from the hospital, he attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology, on the GI bill, where he earned a BS in Physics and Economics. His first job out of school was with Raytheon at the Redstone Arsenal. He continued to have close ties with Monessen, always stopping during his travels to visit family and friends Lou Manderino, and Pete and Nick Demas. He spent many hours with his Monessen friends at Johnson's restaurant.

In 1962 Mel married Jacqueline Bean Allen of Boston. Jackie brought three children to the marriage. Jackie and Mel had a daughter, Nancy. Mel was an attentive and loving father to all of the children.

In later years, Mel and his brother Augie co-owned a business in Detroit, called Elstan Industries, which made automobile parts.

After he retired, Mel moved to Brooklyn NY to be near his children and grandchildren. Besides spending time with the family, he read his beloved New York Times daily, closely followed the stock market, went to museums, and attended the theater.

He passed away March 9, 2010 following a brief illness.

Lightning struck the flag pole on the Jefferson High School on August August ripping it into splinters. A plumber in the building said the current entered a monkey wrench in his hand and ran to a nearby sewer. At Mrs. Jack Hepple's home on Park Way she was using an electric iron, when her electric chandelier was struck forming a ball of fire that expended itself and caused no more harm. () Daily Independent

Holy Name of Jesus Church on Reed Avenue has a new pastor, Fr. Stanislaus Noravek, who comes from Star Junction. (8-8-11) Monessen News

The Bijou Theatre, which has been closed for three weeks of remodeling, will reopen on August 18, 1911. One thousand free ice cream cones are to be furnished by the Philadelphia Candy Kitchen and will be available free to theatre patrons. The added attraction will be G. W. Connors, the Fat Boy of Indiana Harbor, who is ten years

old and weighs 166 pounds. (8-17-1911) Daily Independent

Captain James M. Neil, of Greensboro, died on August 27, 1911 at the age of 71. He served three years under the command of Colonel James Schoonmaker and was known as the best river pilot on the Monongahela. (8-28-1911) Daily Independent

The Olympic Theatre Company has leased two lots on Donner Avenue near Fifth Street adjoining the Monessen Hotel to build a marble front theatre. The company is composed largely of Greek capitalists from Pittsburgh. (9-1-1911) Monessen News

The Monessen Laundry and Cleaning Company has added a dyeing and cleaning annex to their laundry. The new plant is one of the finest in the United States and is larger and more modern than any in Pennsylvania. The company employs twenty-five men and women and was begun six years ago. (9-15-1911) Monessen News

The Kneseth Israel Hebrew Synagogue on Schoonmaker was dedicated on September 17, 1911. M. Janavitz, the chairman, of the congregation, delivered a welcoming address and Rabbi Levendorf addressed conducted the program. Miss Bergstein lit the menorah. (9-18-1911) Daily Independent

Colonel James M. Schoonmaker has written a letter of sympathy to the family of Captain James M. Neil expressing his sorrow that he was away and unable to attend the funeral services. He called the deceased soldier brave, obedient and dutiful, who struggled for the preservation of the life of the nation in the 60's. (9-21-1911) Daily Independent

The Luna Theatre is closed and will be improved. The floor will be lowered and sloped, while six exits will be made. The vestibule will be tiled, and the entire place illuminated with 250 electric lights. (9-26-1911) Daily Independent

The Page Fence Company has shipped eighty tons of wire to the United States government for use on the construction of the Panama Canal. (9-26-1911) Daily Independent

Monessen Superintendent of Schools, H. E. Gress reports that 1940 pupils are enrolled in the public schools. There are fifty teachers and one substitute with each school room filled to capacity, with the exception of the Third Ward school. (9-30-1911) Daily Independent

J. A. Sheetz has decorated a window of the drug store with straw and pumpkins and put a five foot black snake he found on his farm inside the display. A crowd of the curious gather daily to study the snake. He would be willing to take \$5.00 for the reptile. (10-3-1911) Daily Independent

John Check and John Barno went to Pittsburgh to look after the naturalization of Joe Karch, Paul McGalia and John Bogdan. (10-10-1911) Monessen News

John Janosik, of Knox avenue, has received his naturalization papers from the United States Court through John Radacsy of the Peoples National Bank Foreign Department. (10-13-1911) Monessen News
